WAYS TO FUND YOUR RESEARCH

Graduate School & International Education (GSIE)

- The <u>GSIE Travel Grant webpage</u> has info on percentage of funds awarded, eligibility requirements, and getting funding for traveling to conferences to present research. The travel grants include:
 - Presentation Travel Grants: for travel-related expenses
 - **Research Travel Grants** (PhD and EdD students only): for research activities necessary for completion of dissertation
 - **International Travel Supplement** (PhD and EdD students only): for travel-related expenses related to international conferences and symposiums.
- The <u>Travel and Research Funding page</u> has information about the following awards:
 - **A.L. Chilton Foundation Award**: awarded to assist with travel for research or other research-related expenses
 - **Collis Geren Award**: available to College of Arts and Sciences students

WAYS TO FUND YOUR RESEARCH

Graduate-Professional Student Congress

- <u>GPSC Tiffany Marcantonio Research Grant</u>: awards up to \$1500 to fund original grad student research
- <u>GPSC Travel/Conference Grant</u>: awards up to \$500 for DSO members or DSO-eligible applicants for research presentation
- A Research Colloquium is held every spring by GPSC to showcase and award authors of diverse research; stay updated on the next event by checking the <u>GPSC website</u>.

 <u>GrantForward</u> is a research funding database created by academic professionals; the website features a <u>search engine</u> where you can search for funding opportunities, vetted by a team of specialists to ensure reputable, accurate sources.

UARK Libraries works with 3 different citation managers, Mendeley, Zotero, and Endnote, and has specialists that work with each platform; UARK Libraries also provides resources for each citation manager, navigating how to get familiar with and use each resource. Other Resources

1. Connected Papers

- <u>Connected Papers</u> is a website that organizes relevant academic material by a visual diagram. Search topic keywords or an article and the website will visually connect content in a diagram by their relevance and similarity to the original topic or article.
- Connected Papers is great for gathering background information about a research topic or discovering related research that is synonymous with your research focus.

2. Recite

- <u>Recite</u> is a website that checks your in-text citations to make sure they match your reference list at the end of your research paper. It can also catch citation errors in your work.
- Note: Recite is best suited for APA and Harvard-style papers.

3. Research Rabbit

- Research Rabbit is an integrative, online tool that allows you to search for articles, add and organize them in collections, and generates suggestions for related authors and material. Research Rabbit can also connect with a Zotero account to streamline shared academic papers.
- Scroll through interactive web map visualizations of related papers, discover author networks, and share your research collections with others.
